

Orange Shirt Day and Truth and National Truth and Reconciliation Week at Bowden Grandview Schools is September 26-30, 2022

Alberta's commitment to incorporate First Nations, Métis and Inuit perspectives and experiences into the education system was reaffirmed on March 27, 2014, at the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) event in Edmonton.

This commitment included:

- mandatory content for all Alberta students on residential schools and treaties
- a Kindergarten to Grade 12 curriculum development standard
- support for professional learning opportunities for teachers

Education for reconciliation is a step towards rebalancing the education system, advancing reconciliation and supporting the commitments made by the Alberta government in response to the <u>Truth and</u> <u>Reconciliation Commission of Canada Calls to Action</u>.

We are excited to explore the idea of "clans" this week since we already believe that Bowden Grandview School is a "family of learners". Thank you to Ms. Northrup for planning some fun and educational activities for our elementary students and guiding all of us on how to incorporate Indigenous learning into our regular classroom teachings.

In August, our staff participated in TIPI raising and Bannock Making with Indigenous knowledge keepers. It was a very informative and reflective experience for all. On September 30 (a non-instructional day) some of our staff will be engaging in some land based learning and team building while we hike in Kananaskis country enjoying our beautiful province.

We continue to support Alberta's commitment to incorporate diverse perspectives into the culture of our wonderful school.

On course - Dr. Marcie Perdue, Associate Superintendent of Student Services, shared details of the division's locally developed <u>Social</u> <u>Emotional Wellbeing 15</u> (SEW) course with all school-based administrators as the year got underway. This is an Alberta Education approved, mandatory 50 hour three credit course for all Grade 10 students in Chinook's Edge - the first of its kind in Alberta! It continues a multi-layered approach to protecting and enhancing the mental health of students and staff throughout the division.

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Goodbye Summer and Hello Autumn! With trips to the farm, leaf gazing, and sweater weather, there is a LOT to love about this gorgeous season! The essence of this magical season is brilliantly captured in the books featured here:



Lauren Stringer's Yellow Time celebrates the coming of autumn in this exuberant, joyful ode to that magical time when the leaves are changing color and the animals are preparing for winter



With gorgeous photo illustrations, award-winning author April Pulley Sayre's *Full of Fall* explores the transformation trees undergo in fall. The book takes readers through the leaves' initial change from green to red, yellow, and orange, the shedding of the leaves, and the leaves crumbling as winter approaches. 
Indigenous Education




