

As we prepare for our first Parent Teacher Interviews, we wanted to reach out to you regarding some enhancements we are making to the ways we report on your child's progress:

- This year, CESD is transitioning to two reporting periods for our K to Grade 12 students.
 Parents can expect to see report cards K-12 at the end of January and the end of June.
- We will continue to invite parents to participate in parent teacher interviews in both the fall and spring. These connection points are an opportunity for parents to gain a deeper understanding on how their child is progressing both academically and socially emotionally in the classroom.
- Please look for the email on Friday, October 21 that will explain how to book your in-person interviews online. This is the same system we used last year for online bookings.
- K to 4 teachers will continue to communicate student progress via phone calls, email, google classroom and shared assessments. I have also asked them to communicate with you other, more specific, ways each classroom will be updating parents.
- Our grade 5-12 teachers will continue to utilize our Electronic Gradebooks to provide both parents and students access to academic feedback throughout the school year.

Please feel free to contact us if you have any questions about this information. Everyone involved in your child's learning is looking forward to connecting with you at Parent Teacher Interviews on November 1 and 2.

Parent Student Teacher Interviews: November 1 and 2, 2022

Parent Student Teacher Interviews are scheduled for November 1 and 2, 2022 from 3:30 pm to 6:30 pm.

We are finally ready to move back to the in-person Parent/Student/Teacher Interview format that we had before the COVID disruption of the last few years. We are excited to be able to have the opportunity to discuss your children here at the school on the evenings of November 1 and 2. Those parents and guardians who are unable to make these dates work are encouraged to contact their children's teachers to make other arrangements such as Google Meet or phone call.

These meetings take on even more significance as CESD is moving away from fall and spring formal report cards and will only have an official report card period in January and June. Parents, with students in grade 5 through 12, will continue to have instant access to all marks and comments in PowerSchool and are encouraged to check their parent access portals regularly to stay up to date. If you need help accessing the PowerSchool system please contact our office. It is anticipated that CESD will be moving K to 4 student marks to PowerSchool within the next year or so.

Last school year, Chinook's Edge School Division moved to an online booking system for Parent Student Teacher Interviews. The booking system will open for bookings this Monday, October 24 at 8:00 am. Bookings will close Monday, October 31, at 11:59 pm. Please note this is for grade 2 to 12 only. Kindergarten and grade one teachers will contact you directly to book.

<u>Instructions for using our online booking system:</u>

On Monday, October 24th at 8:00 am, please visit our website at www.bowdengrandview.ca.

Click on "Bookings" at the top of the page.

Click on the event called "Grade 2-12: November 1 and 2 Parent Teacher Interviews".

On the first screen, you will be asked to enter your name (Parent), your phone number and email address.

In-Person will be the only preference you can choose. At the bottom of the first screen you will be asked to add your students.


Click Next. On the second screen, you will then be asked to choose which class and teacher for each child. Under Class, the default is "Bowden Grandview Teachers". Please select this as the default.

Then Click on teachers and it will list each teacher in our school. You will add one teacher at a time. You may have to scroll down to find a name.

Once you have selected your child's teachers, the next screen will allow you to pick what time you would like to book provided that time is available. A circle indicates that it is available. A dash indicates it is not available. The booking system only allows you to choose one time slot per teacher. Use the bar at the bottom to scroll to the right for later times.

Once you have completed your bookings, a confirmation screen will appear and a confirmation email will be sent to you. It will have a link you can click if you need to view, change or cancel a booking.

If you are not able to participate in the November 1 and 2 interviews, or not able to book a time, please contact your child's teacher to make other arrangements to connect.. If you are having issues with the booking system, please contact the office at 403-224-3422.



Parents **PLEASE DO NOT** let your kids run out from cars to cross the street during pick up and drop off. Ideally if you could drop them off on the north side of the road west of the bus zone and have the children use the sidewalk side to exit the vehicle.


Do you have a halloween inspired bookshelf? Check out these picks and a few deliciously eerie middle grade novels!

An extraordinary pop-up book that reveals the secrets of the most famous fairytale villians: giants, wolves and witches.






Purpose

Family Resource Network (FRN) focuses on prevention and early intervention services for families and youth aged 0-18 years. Funded by Alberta's Ministry of Children's Services, FRN believes that as long as a child is safe, they can achieve their greatest potential within their family unit. FRN educates parents and caregivers about child development, provides social supports, and offers coping and problem-solving skills in order to build resiliency and success within families and communities.

Process

Through a "hub and spoke" service delivery model, FRNs (hubs) coordinate delivery of all programs and services, which are accessed either directly through a hub or via collaborative partnerships and agencies (spokes). FRN offers programs geared towards early childhood development, child and youth development, parent education, family support, and home visitation. "Hubs" may deliver all services, coordinate independent "spoke" services or empower "spoke" services to support more than one FRN "hub" throughout certain regions.

Outcomes

Using evidence-based and informed models, FRN employs a continuum of prevention and early intervention services to ensure that parents, caregivers, and children receive the care and tools they need to create strong family units, foster sense of belonging to a larger community, and thrive.

Our Family Resource Network Services are available for all Albertans with children aged 0 - 18.

Services include:

Early Childhood Development

Early Childhood Development will serve families with children aged O-6. Child activities will be directly related to: Fine Motor Skills, Gross Motor Skills, Communication Skills, Problem Solving Skills and Personal-Social Skills. Programs will include staff supervised Parent/Child Play; Developmental Screening Sessions with Ages and Stages Questionnaires; and Supported Play Sessions where collaborative partners (Occupational Therapists, Speech Pathologists) attend to assist parents with questions and strategies for improved developmental outcomes.





Child and Youth Development

Child and Youth Development will serve families with youth aged 7 - 18. Program examples are social skills groups, life skills groups, anger management groups, coping skills groups and youth leadership development.

Parent Education

Parent Education will serve families with children and youth aged 0-18. Parent education curriculums used are empirically supported and evidence based. Further examples of programming include Connect, Kids Have Stress Toq. Triple P, Circle of Security and Active Parenting.



Family Support

Family Support will serve families with children and youth aged 0 - 18. Programming is intended to build parental/caregiver resiliency and is focused on the family unit to promote family wellness. Programs are flexible and goal oriented to fit each family's specific needs with a focus on strengthening protective factors and reducing risk factors for all members of the family.

Home Visitation

Home Visitation will serve families with children aged 0-6. This program is designed to support families in providing a nurturing, stimulating and safe environment for their children from prenatal until the child turns six. Families with new bables participate in home visitation services by trained staff in a way that meets their specific needs.
